

Five things to know about cancer screenings

Access to affordable care is the cornerstone for a healthy community and getting your preventive screenings is a critical component of staying healthy. Here are five things you need to know about preventive cancer screenings. They'll help you understand what screenings are, why they're important, and how to get them.

- 1 Preventive cancer screenings can save lives.** Much like preventive maintenance for your car, the purpose of preventive care for your body is similar—to detect an issue before it becomes more serious. Just like checking the wear on your tires before they cause you to have an accident, regular cancer screenings are critical to helping you live a long, healthier life.
- 2 Screenings for common cancers are key.** Breast, colorectal, and cervical cancer are some of the most common cancers and screening for them is often covered as preventive care. This means there is no extra cost to you when you see an in-network provider.* These screenings should be part of your regular screening appointments because early detection can stop cancer from spreading or becoming more serious. In addition, screening for skin cancers, especially if you live in an area with a lot of sunshine, is important.

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- 3 Know your family health history.** Knowing your family history is the best way to know how often and at what age you should get certain screenings. Not sure when you should start certain screenings? The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force updates their screening recommendations as new guidance becomes available. And talk to your provider at your next annual checkup about your family history and when you should start getting screened for the most common types of cancer.
- 4 Premera is removing barriers to getting screened.** Not knowing where to go for care, fear of the unknown, and the discomfort of some screenings can lead many of us to put off these critical tests, but the benefit is often worth it, even for peace of mind alone. Cost can also be a factor, but the cost of preventive care services, like breast, cervical, and colon screenings, are covered for most people through their health plan.*
- 5 Where and how to get care.** Cervical, skin, and prostate cancer screenings can usually be done in the office by your primary care provider. Premera members living in Washington state can see a provider at any of the Kinwell clinics for these exams. Schedule an appointment at kinwellhealth.com. Your provider can recommend where to go for breast cancer and colorectal cancer screening. Find out what providers are in your health plan network by signing in to your secure account on premera.com and select Find Care. Preventive cancer screenings are covered at 100% when you see an in-network provider.*
